Frank Johnson

Frank Johnson has served local government since 2000 at both the county and municipal level. He was elected to the Mt. Airy Town Council in 2000, and at that time was also serving as an Assistant County Attorney for Montgomery County, Maryland. He later served as Special Assistant and then Senior Assistant County Attorney for Carroll County, handling legislative affairs, and was elected Mayor of Mt. Airy in 2006. He later handled federal Circuit Court appeals for the U.S. Department of Justice, but returned to local government in 2014, working as Assistant and now Deputy City Attorney for Gaithersburg, Maryland. In that position he has advised the City Council, Planning Commission and other City boards and commissions on Open Meetings Act compliance, in addition to other legal issues. He has taught Academy Open Meetings classes since 2017, and in 2016 drafted the Municipal Infractions manual, published by MML.
